- Kirit Solanki (1979-86) now lives in Barnet and works for the BBC having previously studied at the South Bank University. He has fond memories of attending several O.C. Dinners as a schoolboy when Mike Walker was head of Sixth Form.
- Tony Stratton from Basildon left the School 11 years ago and is currently in the entertainment business. Anyone who can help with sponsorship for a wrestling promotion he hopes to put on should contact the Secretary.
- Bill Baverstock from West Molesey (1953-58) keeps in contact with Ron Pickett, Geoff Swallow and Ron Cracknell. He would welcome news of any other members of Forms 5U1 and 5U2 from 1958.
- Ken Caplan (1951-56) who has generously and rather appropriately donated his school cap with silver badge to the new O.C. Showcase at the School. (See also Secretary's Report).
- Howard Embleton (1959-65) was a former long serving Committee member and is now back in the UK after a spell in Germany. He remembers Paul Scott (who wouldn't!), Phil Cowley and John Maskell from his cricketing days and hopes to attend this year's Dinner.

- Alan Sheam all the way from Port Elizabeth. A lively member of OCFC's 1<sup>st</sup> X1 in the 1960's as well as the cricket elevens. He recalls playing in the inaugural soccer match at Burtonhole Lane having previously spent many evenings clearing the pitch of stones. After moving to South Africa in 1973 he continued to play both sports but a hip replacement now confines him to golf and squash! He asks to be remembered to all his old friends.
- Roger Good (1952-57) from Hayling Island. One of many who just wanted to be put on the mailing list, receive details of the Dinner and purchase a Club tie. The latter are available from the Secretary at the very reasonable price of £7.50.
- Wally Richards and Mickie Styrka wish to be remembered to all their old team mates. It transpires that they live very close to George Ives in High Wycombe. However, George says that they are local in as much as it seems they both live on the local golf course.

## CORRESPONDENCE

The letter writers come from an equally diverse set of locations:-

- Stanley Whiteman from Swindon who has recounted his experiences at the School during the late 1930's in an excellent compilation entitled 'Recollections of an Old Camdenian'. This is now available on the Website. Stanley was a former School captain and contributed to the Jubilee Prospect 1907 - 1957 (copies still available from the Secretary).
- A fascinating letter from Lionel Francis in Ottawa (1934-39) whose years at the School overlapped with Stanley Whiteman. Lionel enclosed photos of the School Camp at Chideock in 1936 along with other interesting memorabilia. We propose to have these on view at the Dinner and afterwards to place them in the O.C. showcase.
- David Lee from Staines (1964-69) like many others would be interested to hear from any of his former colleagues, in particular George Campbell, Terry Burton and Mickey Dillon.
- Basil Collins from Newmarket (1938-44) mentions his love of running from an early age and his battles with Den Reynolds in the mile at the annual Sports Day. He went on to become a cross country runner with Highgate Harriers.
- It was a particular pleasure to hear from Terry Blackwell (1947-54) a contemporary of mine. He is in touch with another of our classmates, John Alston and also Bryon Blackwell. Hope you can make it to the Dinner, Terry.
- Finally Bernard Smith from Glasewn in Powys who retains vivid memories of being evacuated to Towcester which he still visits. He left the School in 1943 having been taught by Richard King and Bill Seitz and recalls meeting Dave Bowen in 1947 during army service in Germany. Having taught in US universities for over 20 years, he welcomes the School's decision to teach girls separately. They always will be a distraction!

## **COMMENT**

Bernard Smith also felt that the Newsletter tended to be sports orientated and that more coverage should be given to academic interests and the arts - a view shared by Tony Allen (circa 1961), who has been an actor for over 40 years. It is true that sport does feature prominently within these columns, no doubt due to the strong sporting traditions enjoyed by both the School and the Old Boys. Nevertheless we do try to strike a balance and will always report any achievements by Old Camdenians in other fields which are brought to our notice, moreover, previous issues have covered the Club's support for non-sporting School projects such as our sponsorship of the Yamaha School of Music, which is situated on School premises and is well worth a visit. Also our provision of a P.A. system for the Music and Drama departments as well as funding for six students per annum to attend the Summer School at Brasenose College, Oxford.

It is also a fact that, for many years, the Cricket and Football Clubs have been the only active arms of the Old Camdenians Club. The Golf Society is a welcome new addition but there is no reason why the Club should not broaden it's base into other areas. For example, a revival of the Dramatic Society which flourished for many years before and after the second world war with Richard Brown a leading light. Judging by the School's highly praised production of Macbeth at Sadlers Wells recently, there should be plenty of young talent waiting in the wings to join. Incidentally, Tessa Jowell remarked that Macbeth was the best play she had seen since becoming Culture Secretary. If, therefore, any like minded members have ideas for forming a new club or society under the Old Camdenian banner do please let us know.

## **IN MEMORIAM**

### **Allen T Brockman (1924-2002)**

Allen Brockman was a talented and caring career teacher who rose to the rank of Captain in the Royal Artillery and served in India and the Far East. On leaving the army at the end of the war, Allen gained a degree in physics and mathematics at London University. He taught physics at Holloway during the 1950's. His school camps were enjoyed by many boys and on the football field his rock solid centre half displays helped the defences of many of our Old Boys teams. Allen had been a pupil at Sir George Monoux School Walthamstow and after leaving Holloway and several promotions later became Headmaster of that School - a post he held with distinction from 1971-84. Such was his impact as Headmaster that a recently opened building at the (now) Sixth Form College has been named after him. In his retirement Allen was appointed a JP and Chairman of the bench.

He was truly a brilliant teacher, quiet and unassuming with a strong sense of duty and fairness. He also possessed a good humour and was fun to be with. He died in hospital after a long illness. Our sympathy and condolences go to his widow, Irene, who always supported him.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT TO THE OLD CAMDENIANS - OCTOBER 2003

In GCSE, 31.6% of last year's Year 11 students gained 5 or more grades A\* to C; this places the School well above average for schools with similar intake KS2 (primary school) test results. It is our best result for a long time although we expect results to improve again next summer and in the years to come. These results place the school within the top 25% of schools in England for Added Value to academic attainment.

- 87.8% gained 5 or more grades A\* to G.
- 98% gained at least 1 grade A\* to G
- ICT results were exceptional with 53.4% of a large entry gaining grades A\* to C.

Other creditable A\* to C results included:

- Mathematics at 26.6%
- Art at 57.1%
- Music at 77.8%
- PE at 39.1%

Key Stage 3 results in mathematics and science continue to improve.

- Mathematics 44.3% level 5 and above, 20.3% level 6 and above.
- Science 38.0% level 5 and above, 11.4% level 6 and above.

We anticipate that our GCSE results will be above national averages by summer 2008.

We are delighted that the school is becoming more and more popular. We were over subscribed for the first preferences for places at the school this September and have full year groups of 180 girls and boys in Years 7 and 8. We expect the same outcome next September.

The school's tradition of arts and sporting achievement continued last year and culminated in a spectacular performance in July of "Game Show", a medley of dance, drama and music from the 1920's to the present, at the Lillian Bayliss Theatre at Sadler's Wells. This followed an outstanding interval dance performance by our students at a Gala Performance at Sadler's Wells of "Nutcracker" in December 2002. Anton Moore and Ahmed Abdullahi-Farah, who played Macbeth and Lady Macbeth in the school's spectacularly successful performance of that play at the London Shakespeare Festival in 2001, were invited with their Director, Ms Casey, to a reception at 10 Downing Street in January 2003.

Although, unusually, we have not yet won a London Cup for football this year, we are in the (last year's) Year 7 and Year 8 semi finals, our Year 7 team reached a semi final in the London Cricket Cup and our Year 9 team is in the final of a 6-a-side competition to be played before a Premier game at Arsenal. Efreem Semreab won gold medals in 1500 metres at the London Athletics Championship in June and in the Nike 2 km race at Richmond Park in September. Efreem's time at 2 km was 6 minutes 9 seconds and, according to the Highbury and Islington Express, "he blew the field away"! Rhys Shirley-Clarke was in the winning 4 x 100 metres relay team in the Year 7 Athletics Championship. We are planning to become a sports college from September 2004.

Our Annual Prize Giving Ceremony, again generously sponsored by the Old Camdenians Club, is to be held on 14 October.

I am sad to tell you that this is my last report to the Old Camdenians Club. I retire on 31 August 2004. I hope to leave Holloway School in much better condition than I found it back in 1997.

My very best wishes for the future and my thanks for the wonderful encouragement and support the Club continues to give the school.
