Other Contacts

- Alan Shearn (Old Camdenians' own Alistair Cooke) has sent in several articles by 'E Mail' under the heading 'A Camdenian in Africa'. These gave a fascinating insight into life in that country and its' sporting aspirations. Among those to respond were David Lee (1964-69) and Joe Aggar (1961-66) who trained as a pilot in Port Elizabeth and now has a holiday home out there. Earlier in the year, Richard and Jo Brown visited the Shearn family in Port Elizabeth and we gather that Alan himself was seen back in the old country for a short visit during the Spring.
- Lawrence Sprey (1951-57), from temporary accommodation in France, recalled being taught by Ronald Gill, (PT) Smith, Alf Goldsmith, Donald Mansfield, Professor Ahier, 'Slasher' Browne (Music), Doc Atkinson and Gordon Clark. A particular memory was of Richard Vine giving all 26 members of Form 5B three of the best as his retirement present amid roars of laughter from all concerned. Lawrence's own claim to fame was winning the Senior Hurdles at the North London Grammar Schools Sports at White City for which he was applauded at next morning's assembly. What else would one expect from a member of Blue House!
- It was a particularly personal pleasure to read Ray (Nobby) Hordiman's detailed 'E Mail' recalling what were clearly happy days at the School. Ray and I started in the same form in 1947 along with Terry Blackwell, John Alston, Alan Robinson et al. His recollections (what a memory) range widely and humorously over many aspects of school life at the time, such as the House system, the ATC Squadron, life in the 6th form and of course the masters, many of whom were mentioned by Laurence Sprey above. We hope to have a copy of Ray's 'E Mail' available at the Dinner. All the better if Ray himself can be there as well.
- Ray's 'E Mail' also prompted some reminiscences of his own from Bob Pinker (1943-50) who felt that Ronald Gill was not as severe as he sometimes appeared, except perhaps to the younger boys, Bob had a particularly high regard for the woodwork master, Mr Clement whose class he greatly enjoyed and also for Mr L C Smith a brilliant history teacher. He also mentioned Fred McBride, yet another Camdenian to emigrate to South Africa where he became a successful illustrator; as well as Mr Mimack the formidable School Caretaker with whom nobody took any liberties - rather like Bill Collins the present incumbent!

- The recent poll of 'Britain's Top 100 Black Superstars' contained at joint No. 2 Britain's first black bishop, Wilfred Wood, the father of our own Bill Wood, Head of Physical Education at the School.
- Our thanks go to Andrew Dakoutros who points out that Ronnie Ancona, although renowned for her impression of Posh Becks, is also perhaps more famously known as an art teacher at the School between 1992 - 94.
- Thanks to Colin Grant for drawing attention to Bob Wilson's recent book in which he recalled, with pleasure, his association with Holloway School.

Newspaper Articles

The first is from the Islington Gazette dated 15/01/04 by Sarah Harvey, which explains that country traditions are still alive and kicking in Islington. As a result our cricket club gets a mention as there is nothing more typically English than a village cricket club - and Holloway School has had its own cricket club since 1931.

Secondly, there was a tremendous article in the Highbury & Islington paper dated 23/01/04 by Jeni Cornibeer on Dr John Hudson detailing his achievement in turning the School around. This is well worth reading but see later for more news on John's retirement.

The third article is for you older members as I have a copy of an article that F R Hurlstone-Jones, MA wrote on secondary education in London for The London Head Teachers' Association 1888 - 1938.

IN MEMORIAM

Dereck Chapman

Dereck was a very enthusiastic member of the Football and Social Clubs during the 1960's and 70's. He was a real live wire and will be remembered for organizing a variety of social events at BHL, most of which were very well attended and some still talked about. He also produced a lively football club newsletter for some seasons. His commitment to the Club was greatly appreciated and his friendly, sociable nature will be greatly missed.

John Meyer (1940 - 47)

After gaining 8 General and 4 Higher School Certificate passes at Holloway, John graduated from the then Northern Polytechnic with an Honours Degree in Physics. In 1952 he joined the Edison Swan Co. at Brimsdown (later Thorn EMI) where he remained until 1984 becoming a Senior Engineer working on the Blue Fox radar system for the RAF Sea Harrier. He subsequently worked for the DTI in the Patent Office and then the Insolvency Department. Although he never attended the Dinner, John kept up to date with School and Old Camdenian matters and was particularly interested in the reminiscences of those who, like himself, were evacuated to Towcester during WW2 - an experience which made a great impression on him. He always spoke highly of his teachers at Holloway and held Doc Atkinson, 'Bunny' Griffiths and 'Bump' Brown in particularly high esteem. He passed away in hospital in November 2003 after an illness lasting several months.

SCHOOL EVENTS

Apart from the School leavers and the Prizegiving evenings, at both of which Old Camdenians were represented, three other important events took place at the School during the year. The first was on 29th April when Albert Irvin RA presented the School with a print of his oil painting 'Trinity I'. This striking work, which was gratefully accepted by the Headmaster, now occupies a prominent position in the School reception area. Albert spoke with great affection about his teachers at the School and of the inspiration which his art master, 'Tommy' Thompson had given him. Vicki Perez, a girl student, responded on behalf of the School. The ceremony was attended by a gathering of Old Camdenians, School governors, staff and pupils and the Director of School Services for Islington, Mr Bill Clark. A

short resume of Albert's career is given below:-

Albert Irvin was born in London in 1922 and attended Holloway School fro 1933 until 1940. In the Sixth For he was encouraged by his art master, Mr 'Tommy' Thompson. Albert studied at Northampton School of Art from 1940 to 1941 and flew as navigator in the Royal Air Force from 1941 to 1946. He resumed his art studies at Goldsmiths College, University of London, from 1946 to 1950 and later taught at Goldsmiths.

Albert Irvin has exhibited widely in Britain and abroad. His work can be seen in the collections at the Tate Gallery, Royal Academy, Victoria and Albert Museum, Arts Council and many other important public and private collections in Britain and internationally. In 1988 he was elected a Royal Academician.

On the same evening, I had the privilege and pleasure of officially opening the Old Camdenians memorabilia showcase, which contains many interesting artifacts such as school caps, a cricket blazer and photographs of events and personalities. The showcase is well situated on the ground floor close to the entrance area, so that anyone visiting the School should have no difficulty in finding it. Our intention is to change the contents from time to time and further contributions are therefore always welcome.

The third event was the Celebration Dinner on 9th July to mark John Hudson's retirement as Headmaster. Lawrence Irvin and Mike Duffy joined me in representing the Club at what turned out to be a great evening of musical entertainment put on by some very talented students and staff. In attendance were many luminaries from the Islington education world and our own George Ives and Samir Patel were among the speakers. The whole event was a fitting tribute to John Hudson's remarkable achievements at Holloway School and we wish him the long and happy retirement he deserves. We now look forward to working with Bob Hamlyn, the new Headmaster, who was formerly Deputy Head at Fir Vale fresh start school in Sheffield.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

Firstly, you may have noticed from the Obituary paragraph in the Chairman's Report that Alan's brother, John, died. May I, on your behalf, extend the condolences of all "Old Camdenians" in his loss.

Also, you will probably note from the Head's report that the School is going ahead with its application for Sports College status. In this context, the School is mounting an Appeal and if there is anybody who could make a contribution, this would be welcome. The target is £60,000 and the School itself is approaching many local businesses and organizations but, naturally, anything emanating from the "O.C's" would be considered very beneficial, even to the extent that letters of support would add to the impetus. To acquire this status, the Head has agreed that on the evening of the AGM/Dinner, he will have on display the plans and building designs of all the developments that are envisaged, some of which are probably going to be very imminent. The total plans include a Sports Hall and a 25 metre swimming pool together with a floodlit all-weather pitch. As you can appreciate this is a very imaginative programme and planning applications have been submitted.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT TO THE OLD CAMDENIANS - OCTOBER 2004

In my first report to you as the new Head teacher of the school I am delighted to be able to share lots of very positive news with you.

Examination Success

GCSE performance is once again improved: 36% of our pupils achieved 5 or more good GCSE grades - a four point rise on last year. There were once again very strong performances from the ICT and Maths Departments, who also achieved 100% pass rate in Statistics.

Continued improvement in KS3 (SATS) results gives us a good grounding for further GCSE success.

We continue to have high expectations for the future, including aiming to reach national averages for attainment by 2008.

School Roll

The school remains popular. We start this academic year with nearly 800 pupils on roll with girls now in years 7, 8 and 9. We are oversubscribed in these years with pupils on the waiting list to get into the school. There is a lot of interest in the school for next year: we hosted our first Year 6 Open Evening on October 5th and found it difficult to cope with the demand for tours of the building.

Arts and Sports

It has been another successful sporting year at Holloway School. Most successful have been our new rugby, swimming and athletics teams, who are either the current Islington Champions or runners up.

Unusually, we haven't won a football trophy this year but have been in three semi finals and two finals, one of which was held at Highbury before a premier league game. More than twenty of our students have represented the district at football and athletics. Students have also represented London at cricket and cross country, as well as progressing to national championships.

With funding from the Inclusion team a set of dance workshops with students from the Bridge School and Holloway School took place in June 2004 with a focus on inclusion, collaboration and tolerance. This led to a major exhibition 'Respect' at Sadler's Wells of professional photographs and a short film. On the 7th July 2004 Holloway School staged yet another magnificent end of year performance at the Lilian Baylis Theatre Sadler's Wells. Students across all years together with ex pupils performed the

musical Chicago and a second act of a dance spectacular.

Mellon, a leading financial co-operation will fund a project between Sadler's Wells and Holloway School throughout 2004/2005. The senior dance team will have the opportunity to work with artists performing at Sadler's Wells. A mentoring program will also take place for the pupils involved.

Building Programmes

The new proposed building programme continues to gather pace. The school will host a small exhibition of the proposed plans to build the new Bridge School and Sports Complex with swimming pool on the site: Thursday 4th November at 5.30 pm and Saturday 6th November at 10.00 am. Anybody who would like to come and see the plans and drawings at other times is welcome to contact me at school.

Specialist School Status

Holloway School aspires to be a Specialist Sports College, reflecting both our proud tradition of sporting achievement and our desire to continue to raise standards. In order to become a Specialist College we need to raise £50,000, which the DfES will match with £100,000 for a capital development project. The school is therefore looking for sponsors from across the community to help us reach this target. Donations, no matter how small will make a difference. Any contacts the Old Camdenians have with business could be very useful for the school. If you think you are able to help, please contact either myself or George Ives.

In the meantime, may I take this opportunity to thank the Old Camdenians for their continued support and good wishes. I am confident that with continued support, the future of the school is very bright.

After the success of the previous season, with the 1st XI winning a treble for the first time since the 1960's, there were high hopes for the new season. Sadly it was a case of 'the morning after the Lord Mayor's show' with the 1st XI showing patchy league form and never really being in contention for promotion from Intermediate North. The cups brought a modicum of success, with some good performances before going out to sides, which made the final of both the AFA and LOB Cups. The second XI had a poor season, being relegated from Division 2, while the 3rd and 5th XI were both in contention for promotion for most of the season, before falling away in the last few weeks of the season. The 4th XI won two cups and were well placed in the league, but an appalling disciplinary record both on and off the field, saw the club ask the league to suspend the side. The league duly did and all the players from this side were duly banned indefinitely. This was a very disappointing end to a disappointing season and came after a number of years when the club had had an excellent disciplinary record. The new season started with only four sides on a Saturday, and the Vets, with the objective of getting back to the real spirit of Old Boys football, which was not shown by the 4th XI last season.

OLD CAMDENIANS SPORTS & SOCIAL CLUB

At the time of going to press, we have not received an official Report, but I did have a telephone conversation with Paul Scott and he informed me that the resources of the Football Club, Cricket Club and the Sports & Social Club have all been amalgamated under one Committee of Management.

I hope we shall hear further concerning this, but I do know that the Trustees of the "Old Camdenian Trust" have signed for a further five years extension on the lease at Burtonhole Lane, despite the fact that, primarily due to Barnet Council, we have not, as yet, had a specific rental figure agreed for the ensuing five years.
