Gordon is, of course, fondly remembered by many of his former pupils one of whom was Alan Pritchard (1953-1958). He writes, "I was dozing gently against a radiator as Gordon was going round the class asking questions. My name was called out and I opened my eyes to see a finger a few inches away...I couldn't resist it. The day I bit the French master is now one of my grandson's favourite stories. Do give him my very best regards."

Another was Philip Jackman (1960-1966) now living in Toronto, Canada where he made a career in journalism after moving there in 1975. He recalls that his A-level Latin classes were often held in Gordon's office and that the latter would often produce a packet of Players tipped cigarettes and have the occasional smoke during the lesson. It drove Philip crazy as, by that time, he was already smoking and would have loved to have lit up too. He has quit now but only recently. Philip's letter concludes, "Anyway I just wanted to tell you that you were a wonderful teacher and to let you know how much I appreciate all the time and effort you took with me. IN MEMORIAM

Norman L. Fost (1940-1947), 24th March 1929 - 22nd March 2006

Norman joined Holloway at Towcester in 1940 being one of the "evacuee" generation. His brother, Len, already a senior pupil, was billeted at Potterspury where Norman joined him and adapted to country life. He returned to London with the school in 1943, remaining there until 1947 having gained his Higher School Certificate. At school he became a prefect, vice-captain of Green House and a cadet in the Air Training Corps.

After a short spell working, intriguingly, at the "News of the World", he joined the Army – not the most warrior-like of conscripts. Following National Service and a brief return to Fleet Street, he achieved his great ambition, becoming an undergraduate at St. Catherine's, Oxford, where he became Chairman of the Junior Common Room and rowed for the college. University life suited him admirably.

After Oxford he embarked on his chosen career as a teacher, first at a South London comprehensive and then, following his marriage to Margaret, transferring to the more congenial surroundings of Devon. Here he spent many busy and rewarding years teaching at Kingsbridge, ending his career as senior history master.

Retirement provided happy times, divided between tennis, painting, choral singing and voluntary work with the Citizens Advice Bureau and, of course, spending more time with his family to whom he was devoted. Always genial and interested in people, Norman was guided by strong moral principles and a firm determination to accomplish whatever he undertook.

He leaves Margaret and their three daughters and his passing brings to an end a long association of the Fost family with Holloway School. As well as brother Leonard, a school captain, their uncle Alfred, was a pupil and a contemporary of Richard King.

Alex Martin (1936-1938), aged 84

As a teenager, Alex saved the money he earned as a clerk for a securities broker to pay for ballet classes. In the 1940s he danced with various companies including one later to become the Royal Ballet. He moved to Cleveland, Ohio in the 1950s and taught there at the Ballet Russe. He would regale the locals with stories about dancing in such movies as 'The Red Shoes' and at historic events such as the coronation of Prince Rainier of Monaco. In his later

years, he wrote reviews for dance publications in England. Alex leaves no immediate surviving relatives.

Sadly we also have to record the passing of Ivor Jackson (1934-1939) and Michael Clitherow (1959-1966).

The first draft of his History of the Licensed Victuallers National Homes is being prepared prior to publication. George was Director General of that organisation for many years. Alas, Mo will not be at the Dinner but sends his best regards to all his old friends.

4. The Chairman congratulated Pam and George Ives who had celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary in June. On behalf of all Old Camdenians he thanked them for their efforts in support of the Club and the School and wished them many more years of happiness together. Several Old Camdenians had attended the reception.
5. The Chairman thanked all those who had contributed to the Newsletter. He was delighted to see another positive report from Bob Hamlyn on the School's achievements in many areas of activity during the year. 7. Finally, the Chairman expressed his appreciation to the Committee for all their hard work and support during what had been another busy year.

Secretary's Notes 2006

The School continues to progress both on the Academic and Sporting sides. Those who attend the Dinner this year will have an opportunity of viewing the allweather Floodlit Pitches and the state of the Art Sports Labarotory. In the Lab there is a comprehensive array of "Fitness" machines all computer controlled and connected. Indeed, many visitors including some Camdenians have commented that the set-up is infinitively superior to any of the commercial enterprises which cost hundreds of pounds to join and be a member. You may recall that when the Sports College bid was announced an appeal was launched to Club members to support by donating towards the £50,000 required to be raised. With the magnificent contributions of our members, together with others such as Arsenal, £60,000 was raised to which the Government added a further £60,000 which provided the capital for the Lab. At the time, a promise was made that the names of all contributors would be recorded in the School. We are busy designing the necessary Plaque, and the Head has said that as the money contributed went towards the Sports Lab, the Honour Board should be situated in the Lab. Consequently, we are hoping it will be in situ by the time of the Dinner.

On a personal note may I say "thank you" on behalf of Pam and I for the magnificent bouquet sent to us on 50th. (I say 500) Anniversary.

Phil Cramer who now resides in Ipswich, sent me a story about one of the Holloway Girls. Evidently she had a friend who unfortunately died as a result of Epilepsy. Our pupil

had recently won a Bike in a School Competition and decided to raffle it to raise money in her friends name. She touted the tickets around the Shops at the Brecknock amongst others, including the workmen on a local building site raising in the process £680 for the cause. When the draw was held, the Bike was won by a workmen who, knowing how much her deceased friend had meant, promptly gave the Bike back to her. As Phil said, we very often criticise the youth of today but examples like this show that not all the present day young people should be "Tarred with the same Brush". On a lesser note but still significant, my wife and her sister at the Football Match v. the School always organise the Buffet and operate the Tombola. This year as the School team was leaving, one of the young Players came back into the Bar and shook Pam's hand and thanked her most sincerely for all that had been done for the School Team that day. Proud to be a Camdenian!

During the year Ken Ranson was elected Vice Chairman because of John Maskell's resignation. He has also been seconded as an ex-officio member of the School Centenary Committee. No specific plans have emerged as yet but we will keep you informed.

I am delighted to present my third report to the Old Camdenians.

A very busy school year ended with a very successful Sports Day and School Show, which took place at the Peacock Theatre. We said goodbye to several staff, including Mr Ian Laing who retired after 35 years of service to the school. We said “hello” to our new Year 7 students on Sept 6th, making the school now fully co-educational, with girls and boys in all 5 year groups.

Next year the Old Boys will therefore be joined by Old Girls for the first time. Watch this space...

Examination Results.

The school was delighted by the GCSE examination results this year. With significant increases in all the key performance indicators, the school has taken a big step towards its aim of reaching national norms within the next 5 years. Key headline figures to note:

No. of students attaining 5 or more A*-C GCSE passes: 42% (up 9 points on 2005)

No. of students achieving this with Maths and English: 28% (up 12 points on 2005)

No. of students achieving one or more GCSE grade: 96% (up 9 points on 2005)

No. of students achieving 5 or more GCSE passes: 83% (up 12 points on 2005)

We are pleased to note that last year's head boy, who attended the Dinner achieved 10 A*-C passes in his GCSEs, and another boy, Efreem Semreab has been awarded first prize in the Black Pupil Achievement Awards for the whole of Islington.

Building News

1. **Work on the Multi Use Games Area** took place over the summer holidays. The pitch is now ready, and in use with floodlighting. The Sports Hall and Pool will be complete by July 2007.

2. We opened the new **Fitness Suite** last month, which was the result of our successful Sports College Designation. This magnificent resource was partly paid for by our sponsors who include the Old Camdenians, for which we remain very grateful.

3. **Building Schools for the Future:** The school is now in the process of engaging with the three short-listed bidders in order for us to decide, along with LBI and CEA, and the other first phase schools, who will get the contract to rebuild and transform Islington Schools. If all

goes to plan, this time next year there will be further building works on our site as the school benefits from a multi-million pound re-build and re-furbishment.

Arts Achievements, 2005/ 2006

A full and busy year for the Arts at Holloway School and here are some of the highlights:

Christmas Show

For the past two years, the Holloway Christmas show has taken place at the end of the autumn term. Anyone in Year 7, 8 or 9 is welcome audition for a part. So far we have performed 'A Christmas Carol' and 'The Star Who Forgot Christmas', enabling the students to perform in front of an audience and introducing them to using lighting, sound effects, costume and other elements of theatre. Rehearsals take place after school and at drama club.

Bridge School Project

Several Holloway students have worked with students from the Bridge School on drama workshops over the past couple of years. We at Holloway go to work with the students at the Bridge School site. The workshops culminate in performances at Sadler's Wells theatre – so far we have worked on Shakespeare's The Tempest and Romeo & Juliet. We hope to continue our links with The Bridge School and the Almeida Theatre this year.

West Side Story

During the winter term the Year 10 drama students rehearsed and performed West Side Story. Art students designed and created the backdrops and music and dance were involved. Great commitment was shown by all those involved resulting in a fantastic show.

DJ, MC and Music Production

A successful after school music project ran throughout the year culminating in a performance by the schools talented rappers and DJs.

A full day's workshop involving 30 students with garage band Roll Deep also proved a huge success.

BBC Children in Need

A choir of 30 Holloway students rehearsed with members of the BBC singers over eight weeks and joined ranks with the BBC Symphony Orchestra and other Islington pupils to sing at the Wembley Conference Centre on Children in Need day.

Other vocal successes involved a year 10 student appearing on the televised kids 'Stars in your eyes'.

The West End

The grand finale of the year took place in July at the Peacock Theatre in the West End. Over one hundred students acted, sang, played and danced to a full capacity audience of a thousand. A remarkable experience for all those Year 7 to Year 11 students involved. A true celebration of Holloway pupils' talent!
