A Letter from Africa June 2014

We have a **new ANC Government**, following the results of the elections on May 7.It is largely much of the same but the brief details are as follows.

The Cabinet has a few new faces, some have left, and some of the worst have been recycled into other cabinet posts. It has to be said that at least two of the new guys (very few girls) have landed running in order to try and resolve some serious and urgent trouble spots e.g. Platinum Strike which is now 5 months old and water contamination with 3 dead so far.

The big winner in the elections was probably the EFF of Julius Malema who seems to have taken all the votes that were given to COPE in the last election. Malema's court cases are outstanding and so too is his R16 million Tax bill. If he is sequestrated or given a jail sentence of more than one year then he will not be able to continue as a member of parliament.

The DA gained, but missed out in Jhb. and PE. Maimane is the new leader in Parliament following the decision by Mazibuku to take a year off to study at Harvard. Zille remains Premier with DeLille as CT Mayor.

In 2016 we have the local elections when the ruling party does not tend to do so well. The hope here in Port Elizabeth is that the DA will take over the Municipality in 2016 and perhaps they can bring some honest and competent governance into our city and start to take us forward in a meaningful and focused way. At the moment you will see from the numbers that the ANC have less than 50% in PE.

Of course one troubling aspect is that the EFF have the ability to side with the ANC and establish a 66% majority that would permit changes to the Constitution.

My own short term hope is that the new Deputy President, Ramaphosa, will introduce some pragmatic, professional and business friendly policies/standards that will provide the U turn the country needs so badly, if we are to grow the economy, create jobs and thus reduce poverty and inequality.

Talking of growth, our Q1 GDP fell to below zero and if the same holds for Q2 then we will be in a technical state of recession by Q3. And that at a time when Africa is growing about 5%. The unemployment rate of young people also increased to about 36% and all these figures point to the failed policies and implementation of this corrupt ANC Government.
