#### **News from our President**

Dear Old Camdenians,

I wanted to thank you all for the ongoing support of the youngsters at your alma mater Beacon High. I'm sure many of you remember Holloway School fondly and have built successful lives from a solid foundation. Sadly, at this time, many of our youngsters have been out of school for almost 4 months and their learning has suffered hugely. Many have been able to access online learning, but this is not the best education and certainly not what we would consider an ideal situation for our own children. Coupled with this is the impact that absence from school has on the mental well-being and socialisation that is so important during our formative years. We have kept in touch with our students throughout the pandemic and are aware that not only have some been affected by the loss of loved ones, but they have also been unable to leave their homes because of shielding. We all know that sport and social activity is such a big part of growing up and we have a generation that has been forced to miss out for most of this year. The Chair of Islington Futures Federation has written an article out-lining a way forward for our youngsters in the new academic year. At the moment we are planning for social distancing measures to still be in operation in school in the Autumn Term in some capacity, so it is essential that we are able to provide them with the technology that they will need to make a success of their education.

One thing remains clear, despite the Coronavirus pandemic, that the school will do everything that we can to provide for our students. The school has not shut for a single school day, nor during the holidays at Easter and May half-term. Our most vulnerable and key-worker children have been in attendance and our teachers and support staff have gone above and beyond the call of duty in ensuring they and their families have been supported. We have not only provided a place to be, but also looked after the well-being of our school community with food parcels, home visits and weekly phone calls. During lockdown we had higher attendance than any other local secondary school.

I do hope that you will continue to support our students in whatever capacity you can, every little bit goes a long way. Thank you for the kind donations thus far. Believe. Belong. Become.

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#### Chair of Governors – Change a Child's Future

On Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2020, all UK schools closed to the vast majority of pupils and staff. They had a couple of weeks of speculation, but no real significant notice or planning. At the time, some pupils were issued with computer devices but not many. Teachers rapidly put material on-line and made up learning packs to distribute. This affected students across the country at Eton, at Manchester Grammar and at Beacon High. but the impact was not the same for all and it is the disadvantaged who have been disproportionately affected.

In a community where some families were not in work, and now others having to work from home, in homes where very few of which have a separate office area, own bedrooms and outdoor spaces and the uncertainty of being furloughed, perhaps on part income, the capacity to learn from home is so much worse for our students than many others.

Many of our students have engaged well with Beacon High and the remote teaching and provision that they have been providing, but others have not for a variety of reasons. Professional families who only have one or two computers are now competing for computer use between 5 of them and single parent families with a smart phone but no computer terminal face extreme difficulties.

We are welcoming the return of schools, and we are hoping that the virus is suitably controlled so that full return can be achieved, but we know there is a high risk of a short-term return to isolation. A teacher catches it; a pupil catches it; a member of the catering team; the class; year or school is closed for two weeks. Education must continue, and we cannot risk our young people falling even further behind.

Our intention is to provide each student at Beacon High with a quality Chromebook – their personal Beacon High workbook. We are looking to ensure that every student has a Chromebook on 2<sup>nd</sup> September. We are going to be asking parents to contribute fifty per cent of the cost. This is a high cost for a school with a significant deficit that will take at least 5 years to clear, and we need to be able to afford it every year. We know that some parents will not be able to afford to contribute, but they are the very ones who need the most support in their education. So, we are looking to secure student sponsorship to help those who need it the most.

For £120 a student will be given a new Chromebook, that they will keep for their time at Beacon High and will take them through into post 16 provision. It will be maintained and updated. So, are you able to sponsor a student at Beacon High – or a quarter or half, your contribution will really make a difference? It will provide access to high quality education all year, irrespective of our schools being open or closed, it will not solve all the issues of education, but it will take out one of the factors, and by demonstrating that people care, it will contribute to developing aspiration and belief that working towards the future is worth it and it will provide a vital tool.

I was also one of the many Greek Cypriot boys that attended Holloway School in the sixties, and one of the ones that got away, having graduated in Chemical Engineering from Southbank, like George, I worked for five years in London married a Physician, had two beautiful daughters and then all of a sudden we all got the travel bug. We started with Dubai, that fed the ex-pat bug with money and international friends, and gradually having travelled all over the middle East and Far East, found ourselves in Boston, US. The US is an easy place to travel and with a population that is the melting

pot of all the nations on earth, one can find a contrast and something new in each place. In the last 30 years in the US, we have lived and worked in Boston, Washington DC, Springfield Illinois, New Orleans, and now Southern California and in my corporate career, I have averaged 300,000 miles every year on planes visiting half a dozen companies in my corporation all over the US and Mexico. We now live on the Campus of the University of California Irvine (UCI), where I am now retired, and my wife is a Professor in Genetics. #### **Philip Patsalos in Cyprus**

#### Cyprus: An island experience of the corona virus pandemic

For the Patsalos family, 2020 was to be a year of celebration and plans were in place for the christening of our first grandchild, Iris Eleni, in Cyprus in April and the marriage of our daughter, Maria, in London in May. As I flew to Cyprus on 19th February, in advance of my family, I was oblivious as to what was to unfold. The World Health Organisation (WHO) was tracking the enveloping corona virus and it soon declared that a pandemic was to hand. Many countries went into lockdown but not Cyprus or the UK. However, my wife, Ellie, took the last scheduled BA flight from Heathrow to Larnaca on 16<sup>th</sup> March and joined me but was required to be in self guarantine for 14 days; which she did at our house in Larnaca. The first indication that the Cyprus authorities had put effective measures in place to deal with the virus was when 2 days after Elle's arrival she was contacted to be tested for the virus. Despite worrying signs that she may be infected, the test come back negative; I was impressed by the efficiency of the testing procedures. For 14 days we slept in separate bedrooms and kept our distance as much as possible and used hand gels sparingly. Lockdown in Cyprus started on 31<sup>st</sup> March and I was impressed as to how the population instantly responded; the streets were devoid of people, shops closed with the exception of supermarkets and pharmacies and the odd car may be seen. Larnaca was like a ghost town. People were allowed to go out once a day, unaccompanied, but had to have prior authorisation via an apt. Walking one's dog or undertaking physical exercise was allowed and indeed encouraged. I used to go to the supermarket once a week; there were no queues and no panic buying and social distancing and gel use was mandatory. In the event that the police stopped one and no authorisation could be shown, a fine was due. I used to look forward to my weekly trips to the supermarket as it was the only time that I was able to see fellow human beings.

My wife and I had structured our days so that they entailed both physical activities (walking and jogging) and mental well-being activities (reading, singing and puzzle solving); watching the BBC1 6 o'clock news was a must followed by a movie. I was part of a WhatsApp group comprising of 15 Holloway School alumni; all graduates of the late1960s, and it was great fun. Hundreds of messages flowed between us daily and I believe we learnt a lot from each other, and we shared fond memories

of our time at Holloway School. Understandably, the corona virus and its consequences were always discussed with forensic detail and extrapolation as to the future. We also had two Zoom calls, which for me were somewhat emotional because I saw, for the first time after 40 years, two of my school friends.

Lockdown was relaxed on 21<sup>st</sup> May after approximately 7 long weeks of isolation. Meeting up with up to 10 people with appropriate social distancing was now allowed, and it was perfect timing because the following day it was Ellie's birthday! We decided to throw a party. Eight family/friends were invited to our house and we had food delivered by our local Indian restaurant. We had a wonderful evening eating and drinking in our garden and chatting till midnight.

We plan to return to London in August knowing that life will be different and challenging for all. My experience as a 7/7 survivor highlighted that life is fragile and we should never take life for granted because we do not know what will happen tomorrow. The pandemic has re-emphasised to me the fragility of human life. **Philip Patsalos** 

#### Andy Georgiou in Cyprus



Andy and his family were wonderful hosts when we visited them in Cyprus Sept'18: Phivos, Nic, Mike, Nic and me.Keep safe Andy.



I am very pleased to be and have been in Cyprus during this covid19 crisis. The response by the government had been immediate, we adopted all the best advise/safeguards as implemented in other successful countries and now we are reaping the benefits by having had a minimal number of deaths and infections. Cyprus can now be seen as a safe country to visit /holiday.

On a personal level, we had a lockdown for around 6 weeks which meant we had to obtain SMS permission for leaving the house, e.g. for shopping, exercising, visiting the Doctor etc. This was strictly enforced, I had to close my shop but I managed to continue work, to an extent, by using my smartphone, a visa machine ,printer and laptop at home.

After lockdown I opened up my shop again but with restrictions like: 2m distancing, no more than 4 people in my shop at one time, wearing masks and gloves and have sanitizer gel and gloves available for customers at the entrance. Also I have decided to only work mornings because of the slowdown in business activity and the ability to carry out 90% of my work by only opening mornings.

My grandchildren go to school and only half the number of children attend per class to implement social distancing as well as other restrictions. During the lockdown all the schools were transmitting their lessons on internet so that children were able to continue their education.

By being in the EU, we benefited by taking part in bulk acquisition of PPE and a multi trillion coronavirus fund to support individuals and businesses to help them survive economically.

This is our success story; Boris eat your heart out. I am sorry to see that the UK did not carry out such a timely and successful operation and many thousands of people have died unnecessarily as a consequence. Andy Georgiou

#### **Obit Andrew Georgiou**



We sadly announce the passing away of Andrew Georgiou

Andy passed away on Wednesday April the 8th 2020 at the age of 70 and leaves behind his wife Irene, two daughters Alexandra and Kristina, a grandson Ocean, and three sisters Dora, Julie and Thalia. Andy was born in Famagusta the son of Christoforos (Taki) and Loulla Georgiou from Komi Kebir and Famagusta, respectively

At the age of two he immigrated with his family to London then after two years moved to Liverpool where his Father worked in building construction and opened a fish and chip shop. He lived there for ten years which accounts for Andy supporting Everton. The family later moved to London where Andy attended Holloway School. Andy played football for Holloway School being a member of the London Schools S.E. Tye Trophy

(U18) winning team in 1968 (centre forward). He also played for the Old Camdenians football and cricket teams for many years. He was a keen spin bowler and achieved a hattrick against Kodak in August 1970. He co-founded and was player manager of Dynamo AFC that used to play in the KOPA Cypriot Football League. He also played for PAOK and Anorthosis in the KOPA League.

He attended Southbank College and became a quantity surveyor and later joined his father Taki who had started a successful building construction company called G&S Formwork that were helping to build massive buildings all over the country which included Heathrow Airport terminals. On April the 8th 1979 he married Irene the daughter of Hambi and Maroulla Michael from Khirokitia and Ora respectively. Hambi was a former editor of Vema Cypriot newspaper in London. In 1993 he founded and became a partner in a successful estate agents, Desirable Residences Ltd. (known as Des Res) based in Belsize Park. The day he passed away was Andrew and Irene's 41st wedding anniversary.

Andy was a great guy with an infectious smile and a wonderful sense of humour. He had many friends and always had time for people. He was a true gentleman, honest and hardworking. He achieved much for his community and loved his family and was so proud of them. He will be sorely missed. Dr Bob Hartley



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
